

Everychild

For people who have forgotten or who never really knew, our contributions to this charity evolved from supporting individual children in Africa under the auspices of The CHRISTIAN Children's Fund of Great Britain. They then amalgamated with The European Children's Trust to become EveryChild which we have been contributing to since.



In the last couple of years greater changes have been taking place which has meant yet another change of name . Family for EveryChild which is an alliance of 25 local organisations in 24 different countries around the world. The changes have not stopped there with EveryChild and Family becoming one organisation with change of address, the stepping down of Chair of the Board and Chief Executive of EveryChild on 1st Oct 2016.

Personally, I am not sure about all of these changes.



By the end of 2016 St Machan's Coin Jar collections from The Sunday Club, individuals and organisations will have contributed £15,000 to EveryChild. The original target was to have been £10,000 so it has far exceeded that.

Perhaps it is time for US to change. A new recipient could be decided upon or a spreading of recipients - perhaps

nominating a different charity annually to receive the average givings of £500. These could be local, national or international organisations.



Christian Aid





Last Tuesday I went along to the Guild meeting to hear Rev. Stuart Smith from Christian Aid who was speaking on Bolivia, South America. One of the Guild's projects for 2015-2018 is 'Caring for Mother Earth' in Bolivia. Their strategy, Be Bold, Be Strong, will raise awareness of, pray for and fundraise for various

projects one of which is helping the people of this part of South America.

Bolivia is one of the poorest and most unequal countries in South America. Millions of people live in difficult conditions struggling to survive. The Bolivian Amazon is one of the most bio-diverse regions of the world, yet it is increasingly under threat from deforestation. This coupled with climate change has left communities who rely on the forest for survival vulnerable, as crops flood and livelihoods are lost.

Women very often have to spend hours every day collecting firewood for cooking. Not only does this prevent them from engaging in other activities, but when the forest is under water it becomes difficult to get wood for cooking and families are unable to even boil water



Through Christian Aid partners, this project will work with 700 families to educate them about climate change and support them to build and use solar powered ovens enabling families to eat year round. Partnering with the Church of Scotland on Bolivia, Christian Aid Scotland will use this story to link Guilds to their current work on climate change and give

practical ways to get involved.



It was very encouraging to see the slides of happy smiling women who have been given the opportunity to help their families and their communities and to free them up from standing over an open fire all day cooking.

I wish the Guild every success with their projects which are changing the lives of the poorest people of the world.

Christian Aid has worked in Bolivia for more than 30 years. They have been in the Amazon since 1997 and have gradually shifted their focus to concentrate on this region.

The Amazon is notable for high levels of inequality and vulnerability, particularly relating to the rights of the indigenous and farming forest communities and the effects on them from climate change.

During the past decade, Bolivia has experienced the worst floods since records began, which have directly hit the communities where Christian Aid work. For this reason, strengthening resilient livelihoods is at the heart of their programme.



With our support, Christian Aid will have the means to help achieve their goal, so, again this Christmas, we will be issuing donation envelopes and I know we at St Machan's will give generously.

Many thanks for your support throughout the year and may I wish you all a very happy Christmas and a healthy and happy 2017.


We have leaflets available on our notice board in the main hall.

We start each night with games but we have many interesting topics planned, including guest speakers, visits, quiz nights, ten pin bowling etc.


This is a further sign of God's vision to bring the youth of Larkhall in to our Church surroundings.

Hello everyone, I don't know about you, but I love all of the four seasons. Although the summer sunshine is nice, the colours of the trees through Autumn have been spectacular, and we now enjoy nice cold crispy mornings.

We have enjoyed a fair bit of dry warm weather recently which has allowed us to get on with some maintenance and repair work.

Up at the Manse, we have been trying to deal with the problem with the front door. This was due to be replaced under guarantee, however, only a few days

before our agreed installation date, Dalmation windows entered administration.

We are now in discussion with the administrators with a view to resolving the issue.

Otherwise, work at the Manse has been kept to a minimum due to Alastair's recent illness.

And so to the work completed since the last edition of the magazine:

Further to my last report on the water ingress at the vestibule area, we have now completed our remedial work to the outside walls.

This included re-pointing the stonework and applying water repellent.

You will have noticed the de-humidifier in the vestibule area which has been arranged by Graham Duncan. This will help to dry out the internal walls.

This will then allow the vestibule decoration to be completed,.

Graham has since carried out a survey of the upper vestibule and steeple

area in order to identify any outstanding problem areas requiring attention. We have identified where we think the water ingress was coming from and this has now been rectified. This should prevent any further water penetration in the vestibule area. (fingers crossed) Happy to report that Graham's survey did not highlight any major problems and any repairs in the near future should be minimal

Many thanks to Graham for his work on our behalf.

The heating system has now settled down and we have managed to set the temperatures to suit everyone, although it will now be monitored for the winter period. Our annual boiler service has been carried out.

The Church security / fire alarm system has again been upgraded by the installation of a fire call point at the rear hall exit, however, due to problems with the mobile receiver network, we may require some additional modifications.



The fault in the gallery camera, which sends a live video link to the halls, has been identified and repaired by RAK engineering and is now up and running again although we now have a problem with the sound and we are looking into this.

Over the summer, we had three wasps nests removed from roof voids.

A leak in the disabled toilet has been repaired and we have fitted new toilet seats in the ladies toilet.

We have given the vestry a facelift by redecorating, fitting a new carpet and also purchased good quality second hand office furniture. This will serve the minister as well as the business committee.



We have laid new kerb stones at the top of the garden.



Our annual PAT testing will be carried out on Tuesday 15th. Nov. and during this maintenance visit, we will arrange to replace all the lamps and starters in the main hall and one in the sanctuary. Jim Hynd has very generously donated all the lamps.

Up at 2 Marshall street the roofer has now removed the asbestos roof to the rear and replaced with a tiled roof. We will now clean and paint the back gutters and windows.

We can now complete the dampness repairs to the internal wall in the back office and finish off the painting.

We have recently had new vertical blinds fitted to the front windows of the cottage.

And so to our ongoing work.

We still have one new notice board to replace and this should be completed shortly. We intend to use this to highlight all activities throughout the week.

The property committee have agreed a sub-committee of Jim Reid, Walter Kean and John McLean to deal with Health, Safety, Security, Fire Precaution etc. They are now preparing a document which will be posted on the notice board before being presented to all organisations and users of the buildings. This is



further to correspondence from Church of Scotland in Edinburgh and Hamilton Presbytery with relation to "Safe Buildings" and Risk Assessment. Our final document will be printed in the next edition of the magazine


Due to ongoing problems with the roof windows in the main hall, we are still investigating how we can solve the problem of continual drips on a permanent basis.

John Walker very kindly prepared drawings and specification to allow us to seek quotes for this. I have met with Hamilton planning department to discuss our options as we are a listed "B" building. We are now looking at how best to finance this project.



Thinking of the prospect of any major costs for repairs over the foreseeable future, we have asked John Walker to carry out a survey / report of all our buildings. This will allow us to prepare in advance for any major issues.

You may have noticed that the hall fire doors are not closing properly. We await our local joiner to repair / rectify this problem.



One of our members has very kindly donated £100 towards the cost.

Up at the manse, we still have some decoration work to be arranged. This will be done as and when Alastair is feeling better.

With our new constitution under way, we will now be known as the property committee, with our responsibilities changing slightly I am happy to report that we now have a few additional members. The current Property Committee members are: John Gilroy, Jim Reid, Kirsty Laird, Walter Kean, John McLean Alastair Gilroy, Sandra Graham and Donald McDonald.

Please remember, if you notice anything around the Church which needs attention, please contact one of the property committee a.s.a.p. and we will attend to it.

Please keep dropping a white fabric envelope in to the plate as this helps

to maintain our fabric fund balance. You will find these envelopes scattered around the Church. If you can't see one. Please ask me for one

My thanks again to my property team for all their help as well as volunteers from the congregation who never seem to let us down

God's vision for St. Machan's is driving us on, and to him be all the Glory.

May I finish by taking this opportunity to wish you all God's blessings for a happy and peaceful Christmas and good health in 2017

Billy Graham's daughter was being interviewed on the Early Show. Jane Clayson asked her How could God let something like this happen? (Regarding the attacks on Sept. 11). Anne Graham gave a profound and insightful response. She said:


Christmas at the Machan Trust

'A Man called Ove' by Fredrik Backman

A grumpy yet loveable man finds his solitary world turned on its head when a boisterous young family moves in next door.




Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon, the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse. People call him *the bitter neighbor from hell*, but must Ove be bitter just because he doesn't walk around with a smile plastered to his face all the time?

Behind the cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness.

The next read was written by a Scottish Writer, Robert Douglas. The title of the book was Night Song of the Last Tram – a Glasgow Childhood.

This is a wonderfully colourful and deeply poignant memoir of growing up in a 'single end' - one room in a Glasgow tenement - during and immediately after the Second World War. Although young Robert Douglas's life was blighted by the cruel if sporadic presence of his father,

it was equally blessed by the love of his mother, Janet. While the story of their life together is in some ways very sad, it is also filled with humorous and happy memories. "Night Song of The Last Tram" is a superb evocation of childhood and of a Glasgow of trams and tenements that has long since disappeared.



Both books were very enjoyable and whilst both invoked sadness there

were many parts of them both when you had to laugh out loud. Both well worth a read.

The book we are now reading and will be discussed in December is by Alex Gray and entitled Shadows of Sounds

The Meaning of the Christingle

Christingle means 'Christ's Light' and it is a symbol of the Christian faith. Lots of churches hold Christingle services around Christmas time. The custom of giving out lighted candles in these services began in Germany in 1747.

Each piece of the Christingle holds special symbolism to help children understand the importance of Jesus and the Gospel, and its relevance at Christmas time.



The orange represents the world
The red ribbon symbolises the love and blood of Christ
The sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations
The lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world,
bringing hope to people living in darkness.

- 1. Each puzzle begins with a blank 9 x 9 grid. A coordinate system—with the letters A through I across the top and the numbers 1 through 9 down the left side—will help you place the "givens," or starter numbers, generated by the Bible trivia questions.
- 2. For each puzzle, trivia questions will be answered by the numbers 1 through 9. The coordinates with each question (for example, *Al, C9, H3*) indicate where you should insert that particular answer into the sudoku grid. If you don't know the answer and want to find out from the Bible, references are provided.
- 3. Once you've inserted the givens into the grid, you can solve the sudoku puzzle. The goal of sudoku is to place the numbers 1 through 9 in each row, each column, and each of nine 3 x 3 minigrids (the shaded areas) within the larger puzzle. Numbers can never be duplicated in a row, column, or 3 x 3 grid—so use your skills of deduction to determine what numbers can or can't go into a particular box.



One Christmas, the Sunday School heard the story of the shepherds visiting Mary, Joseph and baby Jesus in the stable and then they all drew pictures.

One little boy included a dog in his nativity picture.

When asked why, he explained that it was a German Shepherd.

Father Christmas is based on St Nicholas, who was born in the third century in the Greek village of Patara, on what is today the southern coast of Turkey. His family were both devout and wealthy, and when his parents died in an epidemic, Nicholas decided to help people. He gave to the needy, the sick, the suffering, and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. As a bishop, he was in prison with other bishops under the emperor Diocletian's fierce persecution of Christians

One story of his generosity explains why we hang Christmas stockings over our mantelpieces today. There was a poor family with three daughters who needed dowries if they were to marry, and not be sold into slavery. Nicholas heard of their plight, and tossed three bags of gold into their home through an open window – thus saving the girls from a life of misery. The bags of gold landed in stockings or shoes left before the fire to dry. Hence the custom of children hanging out stockings – in the hope of attracting presents of their own from St Nicholas - on Christmas Eve. That is why three gold balls, sometimes represented as oranges, are one of the symbols of St Nicholas.






