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View from the Manse

Dear Friends

How do we react when confronted by something for the very first time? When we saw our first rainbow, what wonder and awe filled our minds! When we experienced our first taste of chocolate, what delight as such incredible sweetness overwhelmed our taste buds! When we heard for the first time Jimmy Osmond's *"Long Haired Lover from Liverpool"*, what unforgettable damage and shock impacted our sensitive ears!





Many years ago my wife and I watched with great affection and amusement as my son experienced his first ever journey on a train. He was a small toddler standing on a window seat with eyes like dinner plates as he looked with complete bewilderment and amazement, back and forth, over and over again, between the moving scenery out of the window and his stationary feet. How hard it can be to find an

explanation for something that is completely outside of our experience and knowledge, and this isn't just a challenge for us as children, it can confront us at any stage in life.

There are remarkable accounts that date from the early years of the

Second World War concerning some of the more remote islands of what is now known as the South Pacific nation of Vanuatu, which has become quite well known through its regular mention on the TV quiz show Pointless. When military aircraft made parachute supply drops onto these



islands it was the very first time that any of the locals had ever seen an aeroplane. It wasn't till some time later that Australian government patrols discovered that this first encounter with aviation had resulted in the forming of a whole religious movement centred upon the worship of aircraft: The islanders built replicas of planes out of bamboo and wood, and spoke about a pilot (some called him John Frum) as being a

Messiah figure whom they waited for and expected to bring them food and supplies! Without explanation and guidance, first encounters can carry us in unusual directions and to strange conclusions!

As a little boy, my very first encounter with Easter happened when other family members; introduced me to the art of colourfully painting hard boiled eggs; took me to a local hillside early one Sunday morning; encouraged me to roll my masterpiece down the hill until it was shattered and ruined; coaxed me to then eat the inside of the egg! My family weren't involved in a church so I didn't grow up in an atmosphere of Christian teaching that would have informed me about



the rolling away of the stone to reveal an empty tomb: Christ's death, Christ's burial, and Christ's rising again! Without this context it is perhaps not surprising that I came to the conclusion that Easter was all about painting, breaking and eating! As I grew up and was introduced to chocolate eggs, the concept of 'eating' became very much the main focus of Easter!

It might be argued that, in more grown up language, I had at least grasped that a beautiful gift had been given, that this gift had been bruised and broken, and that this gift provided a special provision. The seeds of the significance might have been there but without explanation and guidance I had actually not yet had a true first encounter with Easter! The Apostle Paul speaks of the need for explanation and guidance when he writes, **"How can they believe in Him if they have never heard about Him? And how can they hear about Him unless someone tells them?"** (Romans 10:14)

Our world, our nation, our town, our streets, and our homes are full of those who have not yet had a true first encounter with Easter! They have not yet heard that Christ died on the Cross for them – Jesus is God's gift that was broken for them that they might know forgiveness and freedom!



"He was pierced for our transgressions, He was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on Him, and by His wounds we are healed." (Isaiah 53:5)

They have not yet received the Easter hope of heaven in their hearts – Jesus rose from the dead so that one day through our faith in Him we too shall rise to live with Him forever!

Jesus says, "...everyone who sees the Son and has faith in Him shall have eternal life and I will raise them up on the last day" (John 6:40)

Through our explanation and guidance many may have a fresh encounter with Easter this year and see its true significance for the very first time. May they echo in their hearts and souls the words found in John Newton's great hymn *Amazing Grace*:

'Twas grace that taught my heart to fear, and grace my fears relieved; how precious did that grace appear the hour I first believed.

May the amazing, saving grace of the risen Lord Jesus Christ be with you this Easter!

George Thomson: Hero's Journey **HOW MY ACCIDENT HAS CHANGED MY LIFE"**



I had a severe asthma attack on the 26th of September 2014 where I couldn't breathe. I was taken to Wishaw General Hospital and 7 doctors gave up on me but one didn't Mr. Downie, to whom I was very grateful for saving my life.

My friends and family were called for as

they were told I was critical and had less than one hour to live. They felt helpless and very distraught.

I was in a coma for about 4 months and had 3 heart attacks, I was given a complete blood transfusion, and the doctors then found that I had a hole in my colon, which is why I have a colostomy bag.

When I came out of the coma, I found that I couldn't do anything for myself and had to rely on others.

I couldn't walk, couldn't talk, couldn't eat or dress myself. Basically I

couldn't do anything for myself and had to rely on others. I had ataxia which meant uncoordinated hand movements which shook a lot. I also had a tracheostomy and the only things I could swallow were pureed food and thick drinks.



One night I thought 'Why be sad', so I came

to terms with my situation. It affected my family, my friends as I was a completely different person not able to do anything for myself, which I was not happy about because I had been a very independent chap, but now I had to rely on others for everything.

My wife, sons and the rest of the family were very stressed, especially

my brother who was going through a hard time of his own.

Being in a wheelchair I don't take life for granted. I was transferred to

Murdostoun Brain Injury Unit in August 2015 where I began a long rehabilitation recovery. My physiotherapists, occupational therapists, speech and language therapists, psychologists were helping me to adapt to everyday life. I learned how to make meals, wash myself, dress my top half, gardening, photography, exercises in the wheelchair, also my tablet which I use to communicate to the outside world.



My values are to put other people first, therefore being a different person now, I would like people not to just see the wheelchair but to see me, the person.

I listen to Christian TV and it strengthens my faith. I feel my faith has had a lot to do with getting me through this part of my journey and supporting me with what I intend to do in the future.

With my experiences of life so far, I intend to take my story and encourage people to become stronger.

At the beginning of the journey you may think that you will never make it, but believe me with sweat, hard graft and positivity YOU WILL get there.

Christian Aid

<u>CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 14TH</u> – 20TH MAY 2017

St Machan's Christmas appeal for Christian Aid raised £461. Many thanks to everyone who gave so generously.

Christian Aid week is as above and I would like to hear from anyone who can help with door to door collections or a two hour slot with a can in the Co-op. Christian Aid week unites 20,000 churches and needs us all to play our part to help make it an annual success. Last year,



supporters delivered more than 7 million envelopes and raised millions of pounds for those in need.

In Greece, the charity's partners offered stoves and cooking facilities for families stranded in refugee camps. For people far from home, cooking their own meals is an important shred of normality in an otherwise uncertain world. Just £285 could buy a refrigerator for a community kitchen in a refugee camp.



The Malawi Appeal launched in 2016 raised £267,000 through Christian Aid Scotland. Drought, erratic rainfall and devastating floods have led to failed harvests and soaring food prices. Cash was provided to help families pay for water, meals and other essentials.

The Ethiopia Drought Appeal launched in April 2016 raised

 \pounds 50,000. It provided one meal a day for 4000 children and access to safe drinking water for 700 children.



The Nepal Earthquake Appeal launched in April 2015 raised 4.2 million. This enabled Christian Aid partners to provide shelter, water, food and sanitation to more than 400,000 people and continue to work there.

The humanitarian situation in South Sudan has deteriorated significantly. More than 3 million people have been displaced out of

a population of 11.6 million. About a third of the population are severely food insecure (1 million more than 2015), and this is likely to worsen in 2017. The looting and destruction of villages means people are fleeing from their homes in search of safety. Cholera, measles and malaria are rife. The



price of food has sky-rocketed due to hyperinflation and people are struggling to feed their families. Natalia Chan, Senior Advocacy and Policy Officer for East Africa says 'South Sudan is on the brink, and



at times in 2016 it has felt like all hope might be lost. But when you speak to our partners, who are providing urgent humanitarian assistance against all the odds, their defiant hope reminds you that we must never give up. I am thankful for the hope the churches have brought, in setting out an alternative, positive vision to chaos and destruction. The case is stronger than ever for us to continue our support.

Another generation cannot be lost to war'.

With our fundraising we do make a difference, so let us continue to support Christian Aid in it's vital lifesaving work. Thank you for all the support you give me and I look forward to working with you again this Christian Aid week

DEDICATION



When Bill Mackie passed away at the age of 95 he was one of the St Machan's longest serving elders. The Church was an enormous part of his life and he served St Machan's not only as an Elder for sixty-four years under six ministers, but as Session Clerk for forty years before he retired from the role in 1995.

When he died his family wanted to mark how important the Church was to him, and have donated a new pulpit fall and communion table cloth in his memory. The pulpit fall features the St Machan's logo "Our home in Christ and Christ in our home". These were dedicated at the service on 15th January 2017 and put in place by his widow May, son



and daughter Ronald and Lorna, and grandson Cameron.

The family felt it appropriate that even after his passing Bill could still contribute something to the well-being of St Machan's, which was so important to him in life. The pulpit fall carries the church's new logo, again appropriate as Bill, although a traditionalist, was always keen to see the church moving forward.

Hello everyone, We are now in to March and still await the winter snow. And I'm quite sure it will still come.

The snow drops and crocus are now flowering in the garden, and the

daffodils are ready to burst out, so here's hoping we have missed it all.

Over the winter months we have still been picking away at outstanding repairs .

Up at the Manse the faulty front door has been replaced and a further security light has been installed to the rear of the garage. We have also managed to carry out some other minor repairs.



Otherwise, work at the Manse has been kept to a minimum due to Alastair and Lorraine's recent bad health, however, we now hope to get on with some decoration which has been outstanding for some time.

And so to the work completed around the Church since the last edition of the magazine:

Further to my last report on the water ingress at the vestibule area, we have now completed our remedial work to the outside walls and we still have the de-humidifier in the vestibule area and Graham Duncan reports that the internal walls are drying out fine. This will allow the vestibule decoration to be Completed. Unfortunately, it seems we are still having some water ingress from the clock tower area which we are investigating.

The Church security / fire alarm system has again been upgraded by the installation of an additional aerial in the corridor area in order to improve the mobile network signal, and this seems to have been a success.

The recent problem with the sound system has been identified and rectified.

St Machan's Book Club

The Book Club meets on the first Monday of each month. The books we have read so far since Christmas include:





Rachel is on the same train every day and catches regular glimpses of the seemingly perfect life of a couple she calls 'Jess and Jason'. Her life has been something of a mess it seems and these guys represent a form of perfection. Things very quickly fall apart for all concerned in this much-hyped thriller.

We've been here a few times before in thrillers, in the world of the unreliable narrator. This time, we have three, and every

one of them is untrustworthy in some respect. Rachel is living out a fairly miserable existence; she's out of work, has a serious drink problem and is spending an unhealthy amount of time obsessing about her ex-husband. The fantasy worlds she's creating means we've got to judge what's real and what's playing out in Rachel's head. She admits suffering from blackouts which mean her own memories are wiped



out entirely, as if they'd never happened. I found myself rooting for Rachel even though she's wallowing in a fair amount of self-pity and her behaviour often seems quite destructive.

Each of the three narrators have their own heavy anxieties and the story is split extremely well between the three women. They've all got very different issues with their respective relationships and



we're given just enough information from each to keep us hanging on edge and it makes for a really addictive read. I can't say I had much liking for the others involved but it makes for a delightfully despicable cast of characters.

The book we are now reading is entitled 'The Secret Life of Bees' by Sue Monk Kidd and will be discussed at our next meeting on 27th February.

Forget the title - this is a heart-wrenching, beautiful book and I urge you to read it, whatever your usual reading matter. The narrator of this novel, Lily, grows up unloved and believing that she accidentally killed her mother at the age of four. She starts her story "the summer I turned fourteen", and Sue Monk Kidd perfectly captures the awkward

restlessness of the teenager, longing for love, yearning to discover the truth and fearful of what will emerge. The casual references to racial attitudes in South Carolina in 1964 are shocking, and the unique beekeeping sisters she finishes up with stay with you and haunt you



long after you finish the book. Poignant and humorous by turns, the tale brought tears to my eyes on several occasions, something which has never happened before in my wide reading history. An added bonus are the wonderful facts you will learn about bees... I really can't recommend this book strongly enough!!!

The next read is entitled 'Child 44' by Tom Rob Smith

In Stalin's Soviet Union, crime does not exist. But still millions live in



fear. The mere suspicion of disloyalty to the State, the wrong word at the wrong time, can send an innocent person to his execution.

Officer Leo Demidov, an idealistic war hero, believes he's building a perfect society. But after witnessing the interrogation of an innocent man, his loyalty begins to waver, and when ordered to investigate his own wife, Raisa, Leo is forced to choose where his heart truly lies.

Then the impossible happens. A murderer is on the loose, killing

at will, and every belief Leo has ever held is shattered. Denounced by his enemies and exiled from home, with only Raisa by his side, he must risk everything to find a criminal that the State won't admit even exists. On the run, Leo soon discovers the danger isn't from the killer he is trying to catch, but from the country he is trying to protect
